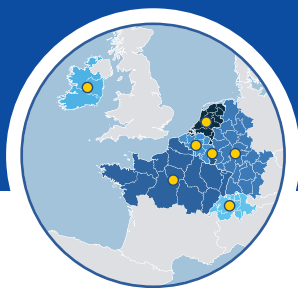

**ENABLING SAFE AND FREE
MOVEMENT OF URBAN ANIMALS**

■ CHALLENGE

Biodiversity deteriorates in North-West Europe reducing ecological resilience. Mammals and amphibians are declining sharply, with the common hedgehog now near threatened. As urban areas dominate the region, cities are crucial for recovery, yet multifunctional green spaces create barriers, like roads, light, noise, fragmenting habitat of urban animals. Expanding and connecting urban habitats is essential, but authorities face mixed land ownership, limited data on animal movement, and fragmented expertise. Collaboration with private owners, citizen science, and knowledge sharing are needed to improve safe and free animal movement in urban areas.



■ OBJECTIVES

Co-develop a joint Urban Animal Network strategy and 7 action plans, jointly pilot and implement solutions to enable free and safe movement in the 4 ecological layers in urban environments - water, shrubs, tree canopy and air; and jointly build



expertise and increasing capacity in 7 urban authorities and local communities and 5 knowledge institutes.

■ EXPECTED RESULTS

The project delivers four key results to improve urban biodiversity across North-West Europe.

1. A jointly developed Urban Animal Network strategy is being adopted by seven urban authorities in five countries (France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Ireland and Luxembourg), with place-based action plans underway and the strategy offered to other cities.
2. 7 replicable solutions are implemented across four ecological layers -water, shrubs, tree canopy and air- supporting amphibians, hedgehogs, squirrels and bats through measures such as wildlife-friendly lighting, crossings, bridges, guiding structures, decision-support tools and incentives for private owners.
3. Tailored training schemes strengthen skills among city staff, residents, citizen scientists and students.
4. 4 partner organisations and knowledge institutes increase capacity through transnational cooperation, enhanced expertise, revised curricula and improved approaches to design, engagement, maintenance and monitoring.
